Description:

One way for universities to positively affect students' development is through encouraging volunteer service. Research indicates that students who participate in volunteer activities have enhanced feelings of selfworth and personal values, an increased engagement in the classroom experience and adhere a greater meaning to their university experience (Astin et al 2000). Working from the principle of the name of the institution "Nelson Mandela" and expanding on 67 minutes held annually across the country, students are encouraged to accomplish 67 hours of volunteer service, within two years. Using Moodle and the uniquely designed 67 Hours site, students are required to record and track their volunteer hours and reflect on their experiences, before submitting for approval on their Co-Curricular Record.

The aim is to enrich student learning by preparing them to be active global citizens and engage them in volunteer service activities that enhance the quality of life for others and themselves.

1. Engagement through Community Interaction, Service and Outreach:

Background:

One of the NMMU's co-curricular flagship programmes is the Beyond the Classroom Leadership programme (BtC) which focuses on self-development and includes students being required to do 20 hours of volunteer service. BtC is however, only a year programme and to encourage students to continue with volunteer service, the concept of 67 Hours was designed.

The objective of the 67 Hour programme is to:

- provide student volunteers to assist NMMU staff within their departments/faculties/units
- service communities in need
- provide student volunteers with practical learning experiences, training, and contacts to benefit their future
- enhance the image of the NMMU within the communities where the students volunteer
- grow engaged and responsible citizens for the future

Volunteer service is:

- Any unpaid assistance that is NOT required for academic credit
- Any unpaid assistance/project done with the idea of helping/supporting others

67 Hours began in 2013 where students were required to submit a hardcopy portfolio which contained a log sheet, reflections and signed proof of evidence of (a minimum) of 67 hours completed from the relevant beneficiaries. In 2015 The decision was made to pilot an online system using Moodle for 2015.

Students who participate in the 67 Hours programme are required to sign up via the 67 Hours Moodle site. They follow the process as outlined on the Moodle site. This involves recording and tracking their volunteer hours, completing an online reflective journal, and uploading forms indicating hours of service signed off by beneficiaries, before submitting for approval on their Co-Curricular Record.

Students can be part of a structured volunteer programme or students can source their own sites. They can do all 67 hours of volunteer service at one beneficiary or they can assist at any number of sites. They are able to choose and/or find their own area of service, and are regularly emailed any opportunities as the requests are received from beneficiaries. Students can complete their hours over a period of two years.

One staff member on the team acts as a contact point for a number of external and internal beneficiaries who require volunteers and informs students of possible opportunities.

An example of some beneficiaries indicated by students are: The NMMU, E.P Child & Youth Care Centre, a primary school in Walmer township, Ironman, Shukumisa Rape Crisis Centre, Isithembiso a place of safety for children. Areas range from North End, Motherwell, and Dora Nginza Hospital, to Walmer, KwaZakhele township, to rural schools and clinics.

Report on your:

2. Engagement through Teaching and Learning:

Due to our multi-campus environment, staff limitations and transport challenges it was decided to investigate how technology and blended learning could be used to enhance student learning and encourage volunteer service across all campuses. After consultation and research is was decided to create a unique 67 Hours site using Moodle. With limited knowledge of Moodle, we approached Simon Goldstone from CTLM for assistance. After a number of meetings and the support of Austin Johnson, an international student from St Cloud State, USA who

was completing his 6 month internship at Student Governance and Development (SGD), the 67 Hours site was initially designed and piloted with BtC graduates only. Testing of the newly designed 67 Hours Moodle site was done with 8 students on 3 March. After feedback and recommendations from students, minimal changes were made and the final pilot product showcased on the 11 March. 23 students attended training and signed up to pilot the programme on-line.

The process for students is as follows:

- Students self-enrol to the 67 Hours moodle site under Collaborative Spaces
- Students follow the steps as indicated in the site (See portfolio page 13: Example of the Moodle site)
- Students are required to complete certain steps before they have access to all activities
- Students must submit a reflective journal
- Students reflective journal is assessed
- Students submit request for 67 Hours to be approved on their CCR

As students work through the site and in order to motivate them on their journey, Simon Goldstone designed specific milestones in the process. When a student reaches 20 hours and has uploaded the relevant documentation, then they are able to claim a badge on the site. Online badges are awarded for 20, 40, 60 and 67 hours, with the final badge being the Ubuntu badge.

Tracy Beck from the Department of Applied Accounting started planning a mentorship programme in 2014. At the beginning of the year, 3rd year and BTech students were requested to join the mentorship programme. The expectation was that only 10-15 students would take part but interest was high, and 35 senior students signed up. 4 workshops were organised with CTLM (Ronelle Plaatjies) where she trained students on mentorship. Weekly meetings were held on Tuesdays to discuss any problems, stories and share experiences. Senior students motivated, encouraged and assisted first year students with their studies. The motto students adopted is "Sipusha Ipassion", translated as "Push the Passion". Several studies support the value of mentoring programmes in universities (Carter, 2000; Fowler & Muckert, 2004; Webb, 1999). These students received no official recognition for their volunteer service.

Tracy Beck then requested a meeting with SGD, and after a show and tell session, requested that the students who mentor in her faculty be part of the pilot process, which would enable her students to receive official recognition for their service. Simon Goldstone replicated the 67 Hours moodle site for Tracy Beck and her 25 students, and she was responsible for overseeing her students' on-line activities and journals. The Department of Applied Accounting is the first department to participate in this project. Many of the students not only tutor but also volunteer at schools, churches and feeding initiatives in order to make up their 67 Hours. By making use of the site, the students are able to record their involvement and receive recognition via the Co-Curricular Record. It has been a valuable partnership and has enhanced the learning and design of the site.

Realising that, as the students began to use the site, more support would be required, a call was made to BtC students to volunteer to assist. Andile Keke, a 2nd Year IT student volunteered and assisted with any Moodle concerns the students had with the 67 Hours site. He was allocated an office in the SGD building and he worked on an appointment basis with the students. He regularly met with both Simon and Tracy to check if there were any issues, as well as meeting students face to face and dealing with email queries with regards to the moodle site. He attended group meetings with both the students in the Department of Applied Accounting, and students who were completing the volunteer service through Student Governance and Development.

Throughout the year a number of face to face meetings were held with students to discuss the ease of use of the site and any other considerations the students had identified. At the end of 2015 a list of recommendations were compiled and a meeting was held with Simon Goldstone to implement the suggested recommendations. Valuable input was gained from the pilot programme and it has assisted us in providing a better product for the

students in 2016. It is clear that many students are challenged when it comes to using the Moodle site and it is evident that training needs to be included as part of the programme.

For 2016, with the new changes in place, we have expanded 67 Hours to include Andrew Marriot and his students from the Department of Marketing Management. The intention for 2017, once the new changes have been seen to be successful and meaningful to the students, is for 67 Hours to be available to any faculty member who wishes to use it to encourage volunteer service within their faculty/department/school.

As part of the 10 Year Celebrations an entry for the NMMU 10 lines-10 years Engagement competition was submitted and the 67 Hours project received special mention from the evaluators and were awarded R5 000. (See portfolio page 36)

Annually 15 NMMU students attend the Grade 12 BWA Workshop. This event hosts 100 learners (10 learners from 10 different schools) across the Nelson Mandela Metro and gives them the opportunity to listen to and interact with influential speakers across a variety of topics. One NMMU student is selected to present and the other 14 students host a table of 10 learners for the day.

depends entirely on the different sites and the activity carried out.

One of our beneficiaries had this to say about the assistance at the centre, "There is a clear benefit in terms of the fact that we have a small team rendering educational services to the children and many of the children often have tremendous backlogs when they come in or are not operating on the level where they should be. Having this dedicated time to focus on learning areas impacts positively and I have furthermore seen positive relationships built between volunteers and children."

Another beneficiary said that the volunteers motivate the learners for a better future, "The young students that volunteer are full of energy and enthusiasm for the work. This is a great motivator for my youth. It also allows them to see possibilities for their own future and helps them to set their own goals."

One company has been impressed with the student volunteers with whom they worked in 2015 and have (February 2016) appointed 40 students to be student volunteer ambassadors for their company.

Some students specifically choose a volunteer opportunity which links to their field of study. Eg: Andile Keke the student who volunteers his time to assist with the 67 Hours, is an IT student. He is able to put into practice the necessary soft skills he will require in his work experience, yet at the same time expand on his IT knowledge.

1.2. Internal communities/stakeholders/beneficiaries: (staff and students of NMMU)

Numerous departments and faculties began to reap the benefits of student volunteer service.

The disability unit had students volunteer as scribes, the Health clinic had students volunteer to help with their events, ranging from manning information booths to helping pack food parcels. The sport department had student volunteers help with fun runs on campus. Departments had students help at the Open Day stalls and assisting within the faculty. The Department of Marketing and Corporate relations had students volunteer at marketing events.

With students becoming more involved on campus, students become to have a sense of belonging, and connectedness. They are able to create professional relationships with staff members, and feel more comfortable asking questions in class.

Students begin to live the true value of Ubuntu, and put into practise many of the skills they are taught in the classroom environment. Thereby, preparing themselves for the world of work.







67Hours - All activity (all roles)










Site visit to Amavulandela Youth Centre

Focus group learning on volunteering in 67 hours

The following reflects the learning from the focus groups held with students who took part in the 67 Hours in 2015:

- Some students want to do volunteer service, but often not sure of where to start/how to go about it.
- Some students are already doing volunteer service, this way they can receive recognition for it.
- Some students want regular face to face meetings, others happy just to do their volunteer service and communicate via email.

Working online proved to be a challenge to some students, some reasons include:

- lack of confidence and knowledge of how to work online
- lack of technical skills to upload documentation
- lack of knowledge on how to do reflections

Further research is needed to determine if the above issues are true for all

Students indicated that they still wanted to print out their work in order to have a hardcopy for their portfolio. In order to meet this request changes had to be implemented for 2016, as the present system did not allow all items to be easily downloaded.

Way forward

- Students to be taught how to reflect on their learning.
- Use more student volunteers to assist with training sessions on how to use Moodle. These sessions must be built into the programme.
- Investigate the possibility of creating video clips and PowerPoints to show students examples of reflections and how to upload documents.
- Staff need to be encouraged to use students within faculties and to understand that volunteer work is something as simple as working at Open Day.
- The online design has been refined for 2016, and will be rolled out to all NMMU students and staff in 2017.
